

KIDS KALEIDOSCOPE CRAFT



Papel Picado

Perforated Paper Banner



Papel picado is a traditional Mexican tissue paper craft that can be made by kids of all ages and adults. These banners are hung in homes and in the street to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, national holidays, and any time there is something to celebrate.

Work together to create one of these unique banners with individual flags and hang them in your church or home to remind you to celebrate all the beautiful people God created around the World.

Supplies

- Colorful tissue paper
- Scissors
- Pen or pencil
- Ruler
- Clear tape or glue
- Cord or string

Step 1

Cut tissue paper sheets into approximately 5 inches (12.5 cm) by 7 inches (18cm) pieces.



Step 2

For a simple shape: fold tissue paper piece in half and then fold down in half again and draw a simple design on the folded corner then cut out with scissors. Open the fold and see the cut out shape you created.

Tip: When you are starting, try to make the designs with basic shapes like: circles, ovals, squares, long rectangles, hearts, diamonds, etc. Remember you have to draw the shape in half at the folded edges so you will have the full shape when you unfold it.



Step 3

Fold the top of each banner pieces 1/8th inch over cord or string and secure with clear tape or glue. Hang your papel picado banner!
